# San Diego River Foundation

The San Diego AAZK Chapter had a fund raiser recently for a local conservation organization, the San Diego River Park Foundation (SDRPF). We raised \$1437 and decided to add AAZK Chapter money to give them an even \$1500. The following information comes from SDRPF's website ([www.sandiegoriver.org](http://www.sandiegoriver.org)).

The San Diego River Park Foundation is community-based grassroots non-profit organization which was founded in 2001. As a 501 (c)3 public benefit corporation, SDRPF relies upon donations and support from the community for its general operations as well as grants, both public and private.

SDRPF is not a foundation built upon an endowment or other source of funding. We are a foundation in name because we are built upon a foundation of people that have come together toward the goal of creating the San Diego River Park.

The vision of the San Diego River Park is a greenbelt from the mountains to the ocean along the 52 mile long San Diego River. This greenbelt is really a trail system and a clean and healthy river system which connects a diversity of parks, open spaces, public places and community facilities spread out along the length of the River.

The SDRPF is working to achieve this goal by partnering with government agencies such as the San Diego River Conservancy, business and civic leaders and a wide range of public organizations. By promoting stewardship of the River and promoting a better understanding of the River's natural systems, the San Diego River Park Foundation is endeavoring to enhance the quality of life in San Diego.

SDRPF works with community groups and other organizations dedicated to the San Diego River and the River Park and its wildlife, recreation, water, cultural and community values to better engage the public in this project. We support projects which help to establish the river-long park such as restoring and enhancing the river, establishing public plazas and community gardens, and telling the story of the river through interpretive programs, kiosks and educational signage, and more. We also work to acquire and manage critical properties which play an important role in creating the River Park.

We are dedicated to making this project a truly treasured regional asset that is valued by all members of our community. We welcome and encourage everyone who is interested to join us in this effort.

# 8th International Conference on Environmental Enrichment

Every other year, animal care professionals meet to discuss and share information on environmental enrichment at the International Conference on Environmental Enrichment (ICEE). This past August, the conference was hosted by the Tiergarten Zoo in Vienna, Austria.

With over 200 delegates in attendance, Vienna demonstrated their wonderful hosting abilities by organizing cocktails at the mayor's palace, visits to the Schoenbrunn Zoo and the Schoenbrunn Palace, and a welcoming and closing banquet where they converted the zoo's hay barn into an exciting party area.



The conference lasted five days and included presentations, videos, and posters that discussed incorporating enrichment into master planning, how enrichment affects visitor stay time, animal welfare, and even moments of enrichment gone wrong. There were also lively round table discussions that kept participants attentive and involved.

# Fire Update from the WAP

Keepers, staff, and I are sure the animals themselves must be relieved that San Diego County recent fires are now behind us.

Approximately 600 acres at the Wild Animal Park (WAP) were burned during these fires, but most will agree that this number could have been much higher were it not for the efforts of WAP staff and fire officials. The majority of the damage was done to the perimeter of the park with the north run, Condor Ridge, and the Center for Reproduction of Endangered Species (CRES) being affected most severely.

Sunday, October 21 started out like any other day, but turned out to be anything but ordinary. Strong Santa Ana winds were soon evident at the park, prompting early preparations for securing all animal areas. Yards and gates were double checked, the cats were pulled off exhibit and secured in their houses; we were ready for a wind storm. Word of the fires came in the afternoon and, as it became evident that they were heading in the direction of the WAP, quick action was taken. Managers and senior staff worked through the night preparing for the worst, but had to be evacuated at approximately 5:00 a.m.

The California condors, as well as various endangered bird species, were moved to Harter Veterinary Clinic. Some animals were shifted to safer pens and brush was quickly cleared to create additional firebreaks. The next morning, any WAP staff able to get to the park, did so to help with the situation. Shovels of dirt and sand, garden hoses, and anything else that was available were used to put out the many small fires around the park. Garage staff circled the park with the water truck, stopping to help put out any fires they could.

The fires burned all the brush, trees, and cactus it encountered but luckily irrigated grass is not as flammable. The animals in the field exhibits moved to the far sides of their enclosures as the fires approached not knowing that they were in the safest area of the park! The cats, locked down in their houses, also did not seem to know of the impending danger that threatened them.

Smoke and ash engulfed the park, blackening all it touched.

The fire burned right through the CRES area, with small fires burning in the cheetah, dhole, and hyena pens, as well as all around them. Most of the animals were huddled down in their dens away from the smoke and flames. Staff worked tirelessly until 2:30 Monday afternoon when we were once again evacuated.

On behalf of the animal care staff, I think I can safely say that Monday night was one of the longest we had ever experienced! Luckily we were told that the firebreaks did their jobs, the winds turned direction, and firefighters came to our aid in stopping the fires from sweeping through the conifer forest and into the heart of the park.

The fire burned right up to the Bird Breeding Center and damaged one aviary that had been evacuated. We lost one of the condor breeding facilities at the other end of the park as well. Trees were down all over the park, damaging various fences and exhibits. Unbelievably we suffered only 2 animal losses—a kiang and a clapper rail. While we are saddened by these losses, all will agree that the outcome could have been a lot worse!

All of the park staff, no matter which department, rallied together in the days after the fire and we were able to quickly restore some order and the WAP reopened Friday, October 26!
